Apply for Conservation Plan Reimbursements

Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection has more than \$530,000 still available to reimburse farmers in the Chesapeake Bay Watershed for costs associated with developing conservation plans.

But be sure to apply right away. Plans must be submitted by May 31, 2021 to be eligible for reimbursement.

The Agricultural Plan Reimbursement Program reimburses producers for the cost of hiring technical experts to develop Nutrient and Manure Management and Agricultural Erosion and Sediment Control plans. Plans developed after Jan. 1, 2019 are eligible. More than one plan may be submitted for reimbursement, for up to a maximum of \$6,000.

York County Planning Commission Update

An update was given to the York County Farm Bureau Board from YCPC Felicia Dell and Rachel Stahlman (County Action Plan Coordinator). They shared a stormwater overview that's in York County's Action Plan for Clean Water and how we can work together in meeting DEP requirements (noted all volunteers). Ag Preservation was asked to share all conservation plans (after sending a release authorization form to farmers). YCCD are sharing their conservation plans and BMP's that are currently in place with YCPC so records are updated in systems and then York County will receive credit. Ag Preservation Board should hear presentation. YCPC will update us again in a few months.

House Passes Agritourism Liability Bill

A bill that would limit civil liability for farms that invite the public onto their property for agritourism activities, one of Pennsylvania Farm Bureau's top legislative priorities, has cleared the state House. Representatives voted 142-60 in favor of House Bill 101, sending the legislation to the Senate for consideration.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Barb Gleim of Cumberland County, would offer commonsense legal protection to farms that invite the public onto their property for agritourism activities, such as corn mazes, pick-your-own produce, hayrides, and similar attractions. Specifically, the bill would grant farms that offer agritourism activities reasonable protection from lawsuits that arise from circumstances beyond their control as long as they warn visitors of the inherent risks of being on a farm. At the same time, farmers would still need to take steps to ensure guest safety.

"We are thankful that the State House of Representatives agrees with Pennsylvania farmers that reforming civil liability for agritourism should be a top priority for the new legislative session, especially as we work to rebuild our economy following the COVID-19 pandemic," PFB President Rick Ebert said. "Agritourism helps farms do just that by delivering what consumers increasingly want: Opportunities to connect with their food and make lasting memories on local farms. But the threat of frivolous lawsuits—and the related difficulty of insuring agritourism operations—remains a significant barrier for farms that want to begin or continue offering agritourism experiences."

The legislation would protect farms from lawsuits in cases where no party is at fault if they warn visitors of potential risks by either having them sign a waiver or printing a disclaimer on a ticket or other material that's given to visitors. The measure would not give farms a free pass from ensuring guest safety and farms could still be held accountable if they fail to fix or warn patrons of obvious and dangerous safety risks. The bill is modeled off similar laws already on the books in at least 20 other states, including New York and Ohio.

Reforming civil liability for agritourism has been a longtime priority for PFB and other agriculture organizations. The measure passed the state House last fall with a bipartisan, 120-81 vote. It cleared the Senate after being amended into a separate bill related to COVID-19 but was ultimately vetoed by Gov. Tom Wolf. Wolf cited concerns about the COVID-19 measure as the reason for his veto and did not signal any objection to the agritourism bill.

Grain Bin Safety Week

February 21 – 27, 2021 was Grain Bin Safety Week sponsored by Nationwide Insurance collaborating with industry leaders and agricultural professionals. YCFB Proposed By-Law Changes

Article I: Strikethrough "Regular Members and Associate Members" and replace with Membership.

Article I, Section 1: (New) Eligibility. Any person, corporation or partnership interested in supporting the purposes of this organization shall be eligible for membership.

Article I, Section 2: (New) Classes. The membership classes of this organization shall be: Voting Members, Friends of Farm Bureau, and any class subcategory, subsequently and duly created by Pennsylvania Farm Bureau's Board of Directors.

Article I, Section 3: (New) Application for Membership. An eligible person, corporation or partnership shall apply for membership to the county Farm Bureau in the county of residence, or of its principal office, in the county of a corporation or partnership. Upon acceptance by such county Farm Bureau and payment to it of the first year's dues and execution of such membership agreement as may be prescribed, the applicant shall become a member of the county Farm Bureau and of the Pennsylvania Farm Bureau.

Article I, Section 1: Strikethrough "Regular Members" and replaced with "Voting Members"

Article I, Section 2: Strikethrough "Associate Members" and replaced with "Friends of Farm Bureau Members".

Article I, Section 4:

Dues. The joint annual dues in the County Farm Bureau, in Pennsylvania Farm Bureau, and in American Farm Bureau Federation shall be (added) based on the membership class as outlined below.

Revised language to identify "voting member and Friends of Farm Bureau" classification. Updated due fees. Strikethrough "voice" changed to "publications". Added section "b."

a. Voting Member: one hundred dollars (\$100.00 ~~\$75.00~~) per member (spouse and children under 18) per year payable in advance to this County Farm Bureau for the account of this County Farm Bureau of Pennsylvania Farm Bureau and of American Farm Bureau Federation The distribution for membership for joint dues in these organizations shall be seventy dollars and fifteen cents (\$70.15 ~~\$64.50~~) per year to Pennsylvania Farm Bureau, twenty dollars (\$20.00 ~~\$13.50~~), per year to this County' Farm Bureau. One dollar and eighty-five cents (\$1.85 ~~\$1.75~~) of which covers Accidental Death and Dismemberment Insurance for member families, and five dollars (\$5.00 ~~\$3.50~~) per year to American Farm Bureau Federation; three dollars (\$3.00 ~~\$2.50~~) for Publications; for membership the distribution shall be allotted and distributed as authorized and approved by the voting delegates.

(NEW) b. Friends of Farm Bureau Member: fifty dollars (\$50.00) per member (spouse and children under 18) per year payable in advance to this County Farm Bureau for the account of this County Farm Bureau of Pennsylvania Farm Bureau and of American Farm Bureau Federation The distribution for membership for joint dues in these organizations shall be thirty-seven dollars (\$37.00) per year to Pennsylvania Farm Bureau, five dollars (\$5.00), per year to this County' Farm Bureau. Five dollars (\$5.00) per year to American Farm Bureau Federation; three dollars (\$3.00) for Publications; for membership the distribution shall be allotted and distributed as authorized and approved by the voting delegates.

Article IV, Section 1: added "Second Vice-President".

Article IV, Section 2: added "Second Vice-President".

Article IV, Section 3: added he "she"

Article IV, Section 4: strikethrough "to him"

Article IV, Section 5: (New) Second Vice-President The Second Vice-President shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or by the Board of Directors. Revised Article I, Section numbers 1 to 15 and Article IV Section Numbers 1 to 8

Adding Transparency to Cattle Market

Farm Bureau is supporting legislation in Congress that would enact a series of changes aimed at improving transparency in cattle markets. The Cattle Market Transparency Act of 2021 was introduced in the U.S. Senate in early March. The measure would establish regional mandatory minimum levels of negotiated trade and establish new reporting requirements.

The bill's approach is in line with the recommendations made by Farm Bureau's Cattle Market Working Group, which developed several goals for improving cattle markets after the COVID-19 pandemic, coupled with fire at a Kansas beef-packing plant, disrupted cattle markets.

"When the pandemic hit, meat prices at grocery stores went up while the prices paid to farmers fell through the floor," American Farm Bureau President Zippy Duvall said. "This legislation will ensure farmers and ranchers have fair access to markets and are fully informed on pricing so they can continue to put food on the table in homes across the country.

Specifically, the bill would require the U.S. Department of Agriculture to create and maintain a library of marketing contracts offered by packers to producers, giving producers better information about pricing when going into negotiations. It would also require daily reporting from packers on forecasted slaughter numbers and set minimums, based on region, for the share of cattle transactions that must be negotiated.

State, Federal Tax Deadline Extended

The Internal Revenue Service and Pennsylvania Department of Revenue have each extended their deadlines to file 2020 taxes until May 17, 2021. The move comes as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to complicate filing for many taxpayers. And at the federal level, the recently signed federal stimulus package made several changes to tax laws.

Pennsylvanians who make estimated payments for state income taxes should continue to follow the same schedule.

Potential Grain Indemnity Fund

A grain indemnity fund is being proposed in PA. A grain indemnity fund differs from bonding. Bonds would have to be secured by the warehouse/grain buyer. Instead, an indemnity fund would be paid through a half-cent transaction charged at the first point of sale by a farmer who is selling grain to a grain elevator/dealer. Once the fund reaches a certain level, the half-cent charge will go away. The fund will be available to pay farmers who were not properly paid by a grain buyer in cases of insolvency. In essence, the fund will act as a form of insurance.

Numerous other states, including Ohio, have either grain indemnity funds, or require grain buyers to be bonded, so that there is protection for farmers. Pennsylvania is perhaps the largest grain producing/grain buying state in the country that has no form of farmer protection. If such an arrangement works in other grain growing states, it stands to reason that the same can be made to work here.

Spotted Lantern Fly Update

Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture has added eight more counties to its spotted lanternfly quarantine area in an effort to stop further spread of the invasive species before spring hatch.

The newly added counties—Cambria, Cameron, Franklin, Lackawanna, Montour, Pike, Wayne, and Westmoreland—are not completely infested but have a few municipalities with a known infestation. They join the 26 counties already under quarantine which include Lancaster & York County.

Businesses, including farms, that operate within or cross through the quarantine counties must comply with certain regulations, including obtaining a permit demonstrating that they can identify the spotted lanternfly and will take steps to stop its spread.

An invasive pest native to Asia, the spotted lanternfly was first discovered in Berks County in 2014. It poses a major threat to agricultural commodities, including grapes, tree fruit, hops and hardwood.


