FSA Program Renewal

Agricultural producers can now enroll in the Farm Service Agency's (FSA) <u>Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC)</u> and <u>Price Loss Coverage (PLC)</u> programs for the 2024 crop year. Producers can enroll and make election changes for the 2024 crop year starting Dec. 18, 2023. The deadline to complete enrollment and any election change is March 15, 2024.

On Nov. 16, 2023, President Biden signed into law H.R. 6363, the *Further Continuing Appropriations and Other Extensions Act, 2024* (Pub. L. 118-22), which extended the *Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018* (Pub. L. 115-334), more commonly known as the 2018 Farm Bill, through September 30, 2024. This extension allows authorized programs, including ARC and PLC, to continue operating.

Producers can elect coverage and enroll in ARC-County (ARC-CO) or PLC, which provide crop-by-crop protection, or ARC-Individual (ARC-IC), which protects the entire farm. Although election changes for 2024 are optional, producers must enroll through a signed contract each year. Also, if a producer has a multi-year contract on the farm it will continue for 2024 unless an election change is made.

If producers do not submit their election revision by the March 15, 2024, deadline, their election remains the same as their 2023 election for commodities on the farm. Farm owners cannot enroll in either program unless they have a share interest in the cropland. Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice, safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat.

Whole Milk in Schools & PFB Action Alerts

On December 13, 2023, Rep. Lloyd Smucker spoke on the House floor in favor of H.R. 1147, the Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act. This legislation would expand the choice of milk options for school lunch programs to include whole milk, 2% milk, and flavored milk. U.S. Representative Glenn "GT" Thompson, along with 329 of his colleagues, voted in favor of H.R. 1147, the *Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act.* This legislation, which passed the House with overwhelming bipartisan support, will restore the option of whole milk in school nutrition programs. PFB President Hoffman was quoted "Pennsylvania Farm Bureau members have waited for over a decade to see progress made on getting whole and two percent milk back in schools. Today, the House had

November 12— November 15, 2023 was the Annual PFB Meeting held in Hershey, PA. Members came to join in fellowship with members across the state, attend educational breakout sessions, and work hard on the delegate floor to pass resolutions you the grassroots members submitted!

York County was well represented on the delegate floor and throughout the event even participating in the Trivia Night!

At the annual meeting delegate session is the largest and most important part of the event. This is where the policies submitted by the members are brought before the delegate body from across Pennsylvania and voted on. 83 policies were brought before the delegates to vote on this year. 32 were passed to send off to the national level of American Farm Bureau



Federation. The AFBF met in December in Washington DC and of those 32 policies, 22 were passed at the national level! PA came in 2nd of submitting the most policies across the US!

Member Spotlight: Dave Badders

Dave Badders is a fourth generation farmer, but has varied a bit from his original roots. Dave has worked for Baltimore County Fire Department for 30 years while still farming his 150 acres...of yellow butterfly popcorn! Dave grew up helping out on his grandparents farm who milked dairy cows and harvested crops. Dave is like many farmers who live on the state's border that is a member of both Maryland



and Pennsylvania Farm Bureau as he does business in PA while having his farm in MD.

The harvest season for popcorn is similar to that of conventional corn with a few hard differ-

ences. The moisture to shell popcorn needs to be at 18% or lower. Popcorn cannot be ran through a grain dryer...obviously! The kernels are sensitive and cannot be cracked or chipped in order to pop, so the least amount of handling the better. Popcorn is harvested with the same head as conventional corn, just with adjustments made to the concaves. A grain cart is not used, but unloaded directly into a truck for the least amount of handling. It is hauled directly to Reist Popcorn in Mount Joy (who is also a Farm Bu-

reau member!) where it is tested and unloaded. Dave's kernels are then shipped out and used primarily for movie theatre popcorn! So the next time you eat popcorn at the movies, think that maybe, just maybe, it came from a nearby farm! There are actually several varieties that can be grown in PA. The US has about 250,000 acres of popcorn grown and only 600 acres are grown in PA.



With Dave's background in the fire service and agriculture, he aspires to share his stories to educate farmers on the importance of Farm Safety.

Fun Fact: Did you know you can put a cob of popcorn in a brown paper back in the microwave and pop popcorn right off the cob!! Thanks Dave for the ride along and education on popcorn!

`PA Farm Bill Research Funds

On December 12, 2023, Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding called for proposals for \$450,000 in research grants through the Center for Poultry & Livestock Excellence created under the PA Farm Bill. The center, funded at \$1 million for 2023-24, is among the critical investments in a robust future for Pennsylvania agriculture in the first budget of Governor Josh Shapiro's Administration. "Funding these projects expands our capacity to tackle costly, complex challenges like the Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza crisis, and other diseases that threaten our food supply," said Redding. "Research feeds innovation and productivity, keeping Pennsylvania's \$132.5 billion agriculture industry growing."

The center invites research proposals that focus on poultry, swine, sheep, and goat production, including projects that:

• advance biosecurity protections and animal disease emergency preparation and response;

• build Pennsylvania's animal agriculture infrastructure, increasing workforce skill proficiency and technology use, including telemedicine use by veterinarians;

• increase food security by enhancing the state's supply chain and decreasing risks; and

• applied research to address emerging diseases and their economic impact, explore regenerative livestock production, and precision farming.

Proposals can be submitted online no later than 11 a.m. on Thursday, March 21, 2024.

Powerlines...Again

A recent public meeting in Chanceford highlighted PPL's plans for new high voltage power line work scheduled to begin in 2026. While this project certainly has similarities to the 2018-2021 Transource IEC, it is being proposed to meet a different need and will not require acquisition of new property.

The Transource IEC line was proposed as a way to move inexpensive Pennsylvania power to southern Maryland and northern Virginia markets. The line would have lowered electricity bills there and raised them nearly the same amount in Pennsylvania. It also would have required a brand new line cutting across many farms in York and Harford Counties. The project needed approval by both PA and MD regulators. MD approved the project subject to a settlement with landowners that largely rerouted the proposed line to existing lines. PA denied the project partly on the basis that it did not benefit Pennsylvania ratepayers, because it would have cost those ratepayers over \$700M in increased rates. Transource and PJM appealed that decision to a federal court, and recently won that decision, which is now under appeal by Pennsylvania to a higher court.

The new project, The Collinsville 500k Project, is part of a \$5 billion solution approved by grid operator PJM to move power in the same direction as the IEC. The biggest impact of the Collinsville project is the rebuilding of 230kV line stretching from Fairfield Road to Otter Creek. This line was just rebuilt in 2017, and will be torn down and rebuilt into an even larger 500k line.

This new project is part of a ratepayer funded \$5 Billion set of projects approved by grid operator PJM to meet projected shortfalls of power in Virginia and Maryland. In recent years, Virginia has added 7,500kw of load from new data centers (the Conowingo dam is the largest dam on the east coast and produces about 570kw). Over this time, both VA and MD have cut significant amounts of generation from fossil fuels and not replaced those with other sources. No cost analysis has been done by PJM to forecast the effect of these policies on future PA electricity rates.

Farm Bureau will continue to work with legislators to promote local property rights, and protect our farms from bad decisions made in other states.
