

CVF Meets with Legislators in Knox

Members of the CVF Board met with county, state and federal legislators on February 17 over breakfast at the Big Country Restaurant in




Knox. Governmental Relations Director, Bud Wills welcomed the participants and handed out papers outlining the public policy directives that are the priority focus in 2023.

The state issues include broadband, dairy, MS4/stormwater, solar, transportation and wildlife & crop damage. Federal issues include ag labor, dairy, environment & sustainability, 2023 Farm Bill, PFAS and WOTUS Detailed information on each of these subjects can be obtained from Bud.

Legislators present included 21st District State Senator, Scott Hutchinson, Outreach Specialist Theresa Hurrelbrink representing 63rd District State Representative Donna Oberlander, 64th District Representative R. Lee James, Brad Moore, District Director for Senator Glenn "GT" Thompson, Clarion County Commissioners, Ed Heasley, Ted Tharan and Wayne Brosius, and Venango County Commissioners Chip Abramovic, Sam Breene and Mike Dulaney.

Most of the conversation centered around broadband delivery to our area, the leasing of land for solar panels, and mental health issues. Rural broadband took center stage right at the start. Millions have been allotted but it's going to be up to local authorities to spend it. Brad Moore said it best, "It's a national problem with a local solution". Concerning solar panels, it was emphasized that the local township supervisors need to have ordinances in place now so that valuable farmland can't be used for that purpose. The Clarion County commissioners have a model ordinance that the township supervisors could follow. The discussion also turned to what a problem we have as a state with mental health which leads to homelessness, crime, and other issues. It was noted that our local state representatives fought to keep the Polk Center open.



Nicholas Elizalde was a student at Walter B. Saul High School, a special admissions agricultural high school in the School District of Philadelphia, when he was gunned down during an ambush by juveniles as he left a football scrimmage.



The 14-year-old was enrolled in a natural resources management course — one of four subject areas including animal science, plant science and food processing — that Saul students rotate through before choosing their focus.

The 130-acre school campus includes a working farm and instills leadership skills and an appreciation for agriculture in urban students.

When MeeCee Baker, a former Pennsylvania high school agriculture teacher, heard the news, she felt it deeply. Baker reached out to Gail Koskela, Saul's livestock teacher, who, after talking with the administration and faculty, suggested creating an FFA Official Dress closet. The school tries to keep a supply of FFA jackets available for students to borrow, but the jackets were becoming "well loved," Koskela says. With more than 500 students, all of whom are FFA members, acquiring full Official Dress can be a barrier to participation for students.

Working with the school, Baker set a goal: to provide 100 sets of Official Dress, including jackets, shirts, ties/scarves, pants, belts, socks and shoes, as well as clothing racks and shelves, storage tubs, sturdy hangers, garment bags, a steamer and signage to designate the closet as "Nick's Closet."

As a second goal, Baker wanted to provide polo shirts for all 550 students, faculty and staff. members to wear during other school and leadership activities.

Baker started a GoFundMe campaign in October 2022 with the goal of raising \$45,000 for the project. Soon, she started receiving calls and checks from individuals and agricultural organizations across the country.

After just two months of fundraising, generous donors have pushed Baker over her goal. The PFB leadership asked each region to donate \$500 to this cause and overall has raised \$8000 to support this school. Our local CVF chapter gave \$200.

samples of their products. Maple syrup products will be available and they will also have maple kettle corn and maple cotton candy, weather. permitting.

From Feb 9 to the 14th, Dave reports that he's harvested 30,000 gallons of sap from the trees on the 113 acres that he leases. He estimates that this sap will boil down to 450 gallons of pure maple syrup. That's just the beginning. The season started early this year and he hopes to be boiling yet in March.

News from the PA Senate

The PA Senate passed several pieces of Farm Bureau supported legislation in January.

Senate Bill 35, sponsored by Sen. Wayne Langerholc, passed with a 29-19 vote. This bill stops the automatic gas tax increase.

Senate Bill 95, also sponsored by Sen. Langerholc, streamlines the home delivery of milk and other agricultural products

Washington: EPA Issues Updated "Waters of the U. S." Rule

On Dec. 30, EPA issued its new "Waters of the U.S." Rule, which will replace the Navigable Waters Protection Rule put in place during the Trump Administration. Farm Bureau is extremely disappointed in the content of the new rule, which not only does not provide the needed clarity and

certainty that the regulated community has long called for, but also allows the federal

government to expand its jurisdictional reach over private property. EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) have doubled down on their use of the troubling "significant nexus" test, which will require landowners to hire environmental consultants, attorneys and engineers to ensure that they are in compliance.

Furthermore, since this rule relies on case-bycase determinations and ambiguously defined terms, it is incredibly difficult for a farmer to understand if they have a jurisdictional feature on their property. With civil and criminal liabilities attached to Clean Water Act compliance, it is critically important to have a clear line of jurisdiction.

The new WOTUS rule now goes into effect 60 days after its Jan. 18 publication in the Federal Register (March 20, 2023). Farm Bureau will be looking to the Supreme Court for a decision in the Sackett case, which will provide some clarity on the use of the "significant nexus" test. It is hoped that the agencies will have to amend the rule in response to a decision from the high court next year.

Farm Bureau Participates on Columbia Gas Advisory Panel

Columbia Gas of PA held its two final "Your Energy, Your Future" stakeholder meetings during December 2022 and January 2023. The purpose of this initiative is for Columbia to gather input from industry, government, academia, and non-profit groups about their future energy needs as Columbia seeks to transition to a de-carbonized future.

Environmental Specialist Grant Gulibon was invited to represent Farm Bureau on the panel, and discussed Pennsylvania agriculture's continuing need for affordable, reliable, plentiful energy in all of our members' operations, as well as and the reality that there is no alternative to conventional energy sources on the near-term horizon. Farm Bureau members are also increasing usage of alternative energy sources as environmental enhancements and power/income generators for their operations. There is a continuing need to make sure that solar and wind facilities are properly sited, with provisions made for their long-term disposal that do not burden landowners.
