Ag Promotion and Education, Policy and PFB Matters

On your behalf, approximately 1900 K-2 students were read the 2023 Ag Literacy book, "The Day The Farmers Quit". Over 30 volunteers stepped it up to read in all private and public schools in the county. "Thank you" to all volunteers, schools, libraries and the museum that participated. Mainville Ag Services, once again, provided the majority of the funding for the books and materials.

The Mobile Ag Lab, Educator's Ag Institute and Ag Crates are also ongoing programs used to educate and strengthen relationships between our members, students and consumers. Farm Bureau has joined with a coalition of ag organizations, businesses and the Pa. Dept of Agriculture to develop the program "Ag and Food Careers in Pa." Schools in the county have been sent information so that students can match interests with potential Ag careers.

The Bloomsburg Fair is around the corner. Last year, Farm Bureau worked with the Fair Association, The Pa. Pork Producers and FFA students and instructors to create a wide-ranging display that included food plate nutrition, Ag Education, legislative information and the sow and piglets. We were named one of the top two exhibits of the Fair.

PFB headquarters is moving. This is not a desperation move, but a well-thought-out decision involving real estate consultants, legal counsel and accounting advice. The current building in Camp Hill has been sold. PFB will remain in the Camp Hill area by leasing office space. The lease is for seven years and the annual lease cost will be less than the current yearly operating and maintenance costs. The sale income will be placed in a special real estate fund that will not be comingled with operating monies. Decisions whether to continue leasing or purchase facilities will come down the road. Our primary mission is to represent you by developing relationships and educating legislators and regulators about agricultural issues. This move will strengthen our mission and is in the best interests of Pennsylvania Farm Bureau.
