### **Manure Pit Training**

During this four-hour session, the training uses a one of a kind manure pit rescue simulator that allows firefighters to work through various scenarios in different roles. Trainers will show participants how to safely enter a manure pit to perform rescue operations in low-oxygen situations. This training is offered through Nationwide and the National Education for Agricultural Safety, and is open to first responders, farmers and ranchers. ### **CHEMSWEEP Program in York County**

2025 is the year for York County to participate in the CHEMSWEEP program. Submission deadline is March 31, so don't delay! The program provides farmers, pesticide applicators, pesticide business and dealers with a means to dispose of cancelled, unwanted, or unused pesticides. Participation is free for the first 2,000 pounds of waste pesticides. The funding source for this program comes from pesticide registration fees, pesticide applicator license fees, and pesticide business license fees paid annually to PDA. After you submit your application online at www.agriculture.pa.gov/ Chemsweep, a PDA Regional inspector will visit your location to verify the inventory, sample any unknown pesticides if necessary, and assess any specific needs. The actual collection of your pesticides should fall between June and October 2025. For questions or paper form, contact your PDA regional office or James Cunningham at (717) 772-

### **PFB Annual Meeting**

The annual meeting of Pennsylvania Farm Bureau was held November 17-19, 2024 in Hershey, PA. Seven members of York County attended the event. There were 176 delegates on the floor Monday out of 187 and 157 delegates on the floor Tuesday out of 187. President Chris Hoffman was reelected for another term, and Julie Schrum was re-elected as District 8 Board seat. Kate Livingston Menges filled the District 8 seat for P&E Committee. PFB Board member Julie Schrum was elected onto the 2025 PFB Executive Committee along with Charlie Porter and Ray McMinn. It was great to see new members there to participate as well as seasoned veterans returning! Now, the policies that were passed will be headed to the National level in January at the AFBF Convention in San Antonio, TX. Your voice was heard in Hershey and will be heard again in Texas!

### **Raise the Barn Fundraiser!**

### **State Legislative Update**

Here are some of the legislative initiatives we are already pursuing to support Pennsylvania's agricultural infrastructure and farming communities.

#### FARMLAND PROTECTION

Solar Decommissioning Establishing clear guidelines for the responsible decommissioning of solar energy facilities is essential to protecting landowners from financial and environmental burdens. These measures ensure agricultural and rural lands can be restored for future use while fostering sustainable solar energy development.

#### WILDLIFE MÅNAGEMENT

Addressing Deer Overpopulation Farmers face significant losses from deer overpopulation and crop damage. We're advocating for modernized wildlife management practices, including:

· Expanding Sunday hunting opportunities.

· Increasing access to hunters for wildlife population control.

· Strengthening trespass laws to protect private property.

• Ensuring farmers have a stronger voice on the Game Commission.

#### INVESTING IN AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

Support for Penn State Ag and Penn Vet Sustained investment in institutions like Penn State's College of Ag and Extension and Penn Vet is critical. Increased funding ensures these programs can continue training future farmers and advancing agricultural research, even as inflation pressures grow.

#### DAIRY INDUSTRY SUPPORT

Fair Compensation and Efficient Transport Dairy farming remains a cornerstone of Pennsylvania's agricultural economy. Key initiatives focus on:

• Reforming payment systems to ensure dairy farmers receive fair compensation in a competitive market.

• Allowing milk hauling 24/7 to prevent delays in transporting perishable goods, supporting farmers and the agricultural supply chain.

#### **BEGINNING FARMER SUPPORT**

Tax Relief for New Farmers Proposals to provide tax credits for those selling agricultural assets to beginning farmers aim to reduce barriers to entry. These efforts encourage growth and sustainability by making it easier for new farmers to join the industry.

### Member Spotlight: Tim Jordan—Jordan Century Farms

One dreary day while delivering wheat seed, I felt compelled to help out the victims of Helene. I do believe that was God giving me a gentle nudge which I usually completely miss. This time, I did not. I heard it loud and clear. I told my wife, Renee, my thoughts and she was onboard with it! As much as Renee, myself, and our boys, Tyler and Tucker, wanted to head south, we absolutely could not due to my family just starting into harvest season. So, I took my ideas to Facebook. I offered a little bit of shed space that I had to people that wanted to donate some hay. They could deliver it to our farm and I'd see that it got to those in need. Next, I got some amazing contacts for Tennessee and North Carolina. These contacts have been just awesome! I hope to be able to remain friends with these amazing people forever! I've told so many people that I'm not sure who needed this more, those who needed the supplies, or those here at home

who donated those needed supplies. Seeing these people at home come together and donate supplies warms my heart! So, first we started sending hay down which was a huge need and still is! The amount of hay that has been donated is nothing short of amazing. As my wife said, "Everytime I see a trailer of hay coming in the driveway, I get teary eyed." Another thing that gets me emotional is the

amount of young men (ages 17-21) that donated their time, trucks, and trailers to help people out they have never met. Then, when I tell them we have money that people donated for fuel, the drivers say "no thanks, use that for supplies for those in need." That gives me hope for the next generation!

We have helped coordinate 54 loads this far that went south. Not every load has moved through our fartm, but we had something to do with each one. I used some very conservative numbers, but as of December 15, 2024, we shipped over 156 tons of hay (\$28,000-\$30,000 worth). We sent three more loads before Christmas, and more the week after Christmas. We have also sent several loads of fencing supplies, as well as a toy run. While a few men from church were down delivering fencing supplies to Creston, NC, they overheard many families coming up to the Fire Chief, and saying they now have power but lost everything in their freezer. When they returned home and shared this story Sunday morning at church, I completely got nothing out of the sermon as my brain went right to work on figuring out how to get frozen food to Creston.



Back to Facebook I went to ask for chest freezers to use to haul frozen meat on my gooseneck trailer. The people came through once again with seven chest freezers, four of which I was told to donate to the victims! I had no idea how much frozen meat people would donate but within 2 days six of the freezers were full and seventh was 2/3 full. That Friday, my dad, Bob and mom, Lois, my wife Renee, myself, and my son Tucker headed for Grey, Tennessee with a trailer load of fence supplies. My oldest son, Tyler and his friend, Ryan followed with a trailer load of milk replacer and grass seed. We delivered our supplies Friday afternoon and talked with a few farmers. We were able to see the hay yard we had been sending hay to, got to meet my contact Joseph Redman, ate an amazing dinner and headed to our hotel room for the night. Saturday morning, my nephew, Dalton and his wife, Ali left home around 2:30 AM headed to Creston with the frozen meat. We drove into Creston, NC from TN to meet them. I've given Dalton many jobs over the years on the farm, but this was by

> far the MOST important one yet! This was a day none of us will ever forget as it was filled with a whirlwind of emotion! There were hugs, tears, and lots of laughs. We met people that day that are now great friends. The ride home from Creston Sunday was a quiet one. We loved being there but felt guilty coming home to warm houses with electric and running water. The best way I can describe our trip is I felt like a drop in a bucket. So much devastation you don't know which way to turn

or where to start helping. But we were honored to be that drop in the bucket. With enough drops in that bucket, it will eventually get full. We were blessed to be a blessing. We are still sending hay, food and other supplies down and will continue as long as they need and the great people here in PA continue to donate. You have all been amazing!! As I sit writing this, my seventeen year old nephew Dustin and his buddy Chase are making their way down 81 headed to Creston with another load of hay, then going to help a roofing crew for a day before returning home for church Sunday morning. The God stories coming out of all of this is nothing short of amazing!! I can't share all of them or they will fill up this entire January newsletter! If you want to hear more, look me up, I'd be glad to share more. If anyone would like to donate hay/money for fuel and or other supplies, please get ahold of me! Thank you to Julie for asking me to share this story to reach new people! Please, continue to pray for these amazing people who lost so much. God hears your prayers and I see him working in amazing ways with all of this, I give Him all the Glory!




