### Tax Tips by Karen.....

One of the advantages of someone running their own business is hiring family members, which can provide a deduction for compensation paid. When including family members in business operations, certain tax treatment and employment tax rules apply.

Both spouses carrying on a trade or business. If spouses carry on a business together and share in the profits and losses, they may be partners whether or not they have a formal partnership agreement. There are different filing requirements for a sole proprietor vs. a joint venture as a partnership. The spouses can elect not to treat the joint venture as a partnership by making a qualified joint venture election.

Qualified joint venture. Spouses may elect treatment as a qualified joint venture instead of a partnership. A qualified joint venture conducts a trade or business where:

- The only members are a married couple who file a joint return,
- Both spouses materially participate in the trade or business, and
- Both spouses elect not to be treated as a partnership.

Only businesses owned and operated by spouses as co-owners and not in the name of a state law entity, such as a limited partnership or limited liability company, are eligible for the qualified joint venture election.

Employment taxes. If the business has employees, either of the spouses as sole proprietors may report and pay the employment taxes. The spouse, as an employer, must have an EIN for their sole proprietorship. If the business filed or paid employment taxes for part of the year under the partnership's EIN, the spouse may be considered the employee's "successor employer" for purposes of figuring whether wages reached the Social Security and federal unemployment wage base limits.

The wages for the services of an individual who works for their spouse, or parent employed by a child, are subject to income tax withholding and Social Security and Medicare taxes, but not the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

Additionally, there are special rules for children employed by parents. Children under the age of 18 are not subject to Social Security and Medicare taxes on their wages if the business is a sole proprietorship or a partnership in which each partner(s) is a parent of the child. Additionally, the payments for wages to a child under age 21 are not subject to FUTA.

For 2023, the Juniata County Farm Bureau Board of Directors has listed the following as the Top 5 policies they see affecting Juniata County agriculture and also two research topics they feel more research is needed for better understanding:

- 1. We recommend broadband be considered a public utility regulated by the Public Utility Commission in order to expedite placement of fiber optic cable on poles belonging to other utilities.
- 2. We recommend Pennsylvania farmers be exempt from the IFTA and UCR regulations if they travel interstate less than 5,000 miles per year from the Pennsylvania borders.
- 3. We recommend that there be no further expansion of Sunday hunting beyond crow, coyote, fox, as well as woodchuck, in cultivated fields with express written permission of the landowner.
- 4. We recommend eliminating state funding for solar projects producing electricity for the grid unless placed on existing structures.
- 5. We support scientific research to document the continuous improvement and beneficial impact of agricultural efforts designed to increase climate resilience, improve water quality and soil health, sequester more carbon in the soil and prevent soil erosion and federal climate change policy that reflects regional variations.

#### **Research Topics**

- 1. **The shortage of skilled laborers** and their willingness to work. Jobs, especially those requiring operation of heavy machinery, are staffed by unqualified people while those who are qualified for these positions are not filling them. Research how to staff these specialized jobs with qualified people.
- 2. **Enforcement of the Right to Repair law**, including closing the loophole in the current law, so that farmers have the ability to repair their own equipment. Research how to close the loophole in the law and appropriate means of enforcement.




